Text 1 Speech



• How many of you know that World Pangolin Day is coming up? This special day is held on the third Saturday of February every year. I first heard of this animal when I was watching a documentary about illegal wildlife trade with my brother. The narrator asked the audience to spread awareness of this problem. Since it is Wildlife Week here at school,

5 my brother, who's a fervent animal lover, urged me to share with you why the pangolin needs our help today.

There are a total of eight species of pangolins in the world—four of them in Asia and four of them in Africa. They're the only mammal on earth that is covered from head to tail in scales. When they feel threatened, they roll themselves up into a tight ball. Their
 armour of scales protects them against predators in the wild. But it's also because of their passivity that they've become easy prey for unscrupulous poachers.

3 The pangolin's population is difficult to predict. This is because it's crucial for them to stay off the radar of predators. Having said that, we do know that six of the species are either threatened or endangered. Their scales are believed to have medicinal properties.
15 They supposedly help cure a number of health conditions, including blood circulation problems, inflammation and breastfeeding issues. However, there's no actual scientific basis for these claims. Their flesh is also considered a delicacy in some countries. It can fetch a high price in restaurants.



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It is believed that illegal pangolin trade now accounts
for up to 20% of the entire wildlife black market. At least 100,000 pangolins are slaughtered each year. This makes them the most trafficked animal on the planet! It's cruel of humans to drive this unique species to the brink of extinction. It's painfully clear that something needs to be 25 done to rescue the defenceless pangolin.

5 My teacher once told me that we all have the power



to change what we think is wrong. It's infuriating that many species have already become extinct because of humans. Soon the pangolin will disappear if we continue to ignore the long-term problem of illegal wildlife trade. It's possible for us to stop this together by 30 raising awareness and supporting organizations dedicated to wildlife conservation. The

pangolin is in need of our help. Let's take a stand together and say 'no' to wildlife trafficking!
