

For example, when we read The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, we are blown away by the 20 brilliance of the intelligent detective and his incredible eye for the most minor details.

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Likewise, the mysterious Cheshire Cat with his trademark grin and the strange Mad Hatter's fondness for tea parties in *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* entice and draw us into the story. We cannot wait to see what other unusual yet wonderful creatures Alice will meet.
