Text 2 Debate speech

Is plastic surgery harmful to society?

- ① Good morning, fellow students and honoured teachers. We are here this afternoon to debate the motion 'Plastic surgery is harmful to society'. I am for the motion because plastic surgery promotes an
- 5 unhealthy emphasis on physical appearance. It also has severe health risks, and carries a significant possibility of regret, especially among young people. I will present four reasons as to why I support the motion.
- ② The chief reason I oppose plastic surgery is because
- 10 it encourages a focus on outward appearance. This emphasis on physical beauty makes us wrongly believe that our self-worth is reliant on our appearances. In magazines and films, we constantly see images of supposedly beautiful people. This causes us to believe
- 15 these images are the ideals of beauty. Inevitably, we start to judge ourselves in comparison to these ideals. We wish we had been born with slimmer bodies, like the ones we see on TV. We start to think that if only we had been born with straighter noses or higher
- 20 cheekbones or different eyelids, our lives would have been much better. Such pointless comparisons can have a damaging effect on our self-esteem.



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3 Plastic surgery can seem like a quick fix to all of our problems. But in no way do I agree with proponents of plastic surgery that these procedures can improve our self-esteem in
25 addition to our looks. Our self-esteem should not depend on how we look, or on notions of beauty that are based on subjectivity. The truth is that real beauty can be found in all shapes and sizes. As a society, we should encourage these diverse forms of beauty. Society would be much better off if it was receptive towards different standards. Plastic surgery, however, clearly contributes to the narrowing of such
30 standards.



4 As with any medical procedure, plastic surgery carries severe risks. In any operation, dozens of things can go wrong. This includes excessive blood loss and organ damage to life-threatening infections. Never should a doctor
35 recommend that a patient undergo a medically unnecessary procedure because innumerable patients have died needlessly. But even in cases without medical complications, there is still a lengthy recovery time after the operations. The whole process takes a heavy toll on the
40 body.

5 Another major drawback of plastic surgery is the regret that many patients feel after going under the knife. Rarely do the results of the operations turn out the way that patients expect or hope for. There are numerous stories of
45 people who, for one reason or another, deeply regret having had plastic surgery. Sometimes, patients are driven to despair about how fake they look. Other times, people feel some sort of emotional distress when they realize that they no longer recognize themselves in the mirror.
50 Unfortunately, most of these procedures cannot easily be reversed.

6 For all of these reasons, I oppose the continued and widespread use of plastic surgery, especially among young adults. We should educate our next generation about
55 accept diversity. We should nurture talents and not vanity. We should be accepting of different types of beauty. Our society would have been much more content if only we had learnt to value inner rather than outer beauty.
