Schools and education around the world

- 1 There are around 1.8 billion young people between 10 and 24 around the world. Many of them go to school, just like you. So, what is going to school like in other countries?
- 2 Omodobu grabbed his backpack and hopped on a canoe for school. Where did he go to school? He went to the Makoko Floating School in Lagos, Nigeria. Nigerian architect Kunlé Adeyemi
- 10 built this innovative school for the Makoko water community because the only primary school in the area was often destroyed by floods.

 There were three floors in the award-winning structure—the
 - playground was on the ground floor and two classrooms were above it. Unfortunately, the school collapsed in 2016 due to heavy rainfall,
- 20 but students like Omodobu were unharmed by the incident.

3 In Finland, temperatures can get as low as −15°C in winter, but this does not stop Juha from going to school. 'We call our teachers by their first names at school,' says Juha. Children in this country do not start school until they are seven years old, and they do not need to do homework or tests until they are teenagers. Students of different capabilities are taught in the same classroom, which means that they will not be judged by their performance at school. In fact, there is only one public exam when they are 16, and 93% of Finnish students complete secondary education.
