1 In the debate over GMOs—genetically modified organisms—it can be difficult to separate fact from fiction. Are these crops unsafe? Or should we put our fears to rest and head for a GMO buffet?


5 However, GMOs are restricted or banned in 38 countries worldwide, and a growing number of people are choosing to only eat organic produce, which is all-natural. Where does this fear come

- 20 from? One issue is that GMOs have not been around for very long, so we cannot find any studies on the health effects over a full lifetime. There are also some concerns that there may be unexpected results of playing with nature.

6 However, GMOs may become necessary in the future. As the world population increases, growing GM crops may be the only way to make enough food for everyone.

25 7 In early 2001, the Hong Kong government decided to make labelling products with GMO ingredients optional. Labels allow people to have the choice of whether or not to eat these ingredients. Opponents argue this creates unnecessary fear, and could raise the cost of food if companies feel they have to use all organic ingredients.

8 Though the debate continues, it is clear that thoroughly testing GMOs should 30 continue. Also, if it is true that 'you are what you eat', then it is our responsibility to educate ourselves about our food.
