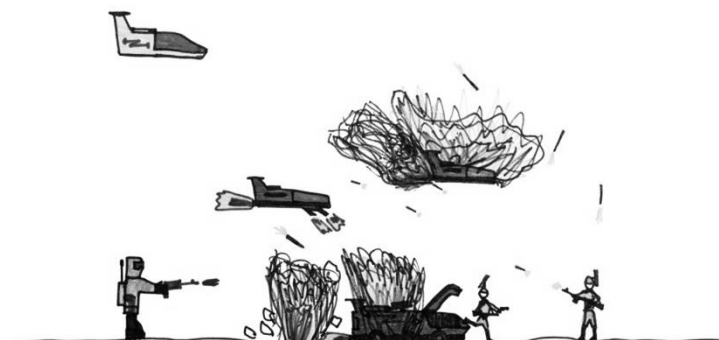
Text 2 Newsletter article



- ① The child's face was turning purple and contorting in anger while she was holding the doll with an iron grip, refusing to let it go. 'But I want it, Mummy!' The red-faced mother was clearly uncomfortable under the spotlight while judgemental shoppers stared and tut-tutted under their breaths. Suddenly, the mother let go of the doll and took a step back.
- 5 The little girl of around four paused mid-tantrum and froze. 'What will this mother do next?' I was wondering.

Parents raise the white flag

- ② Many mothers would be tempted to be irresponsible and stick to the 'Generation-Give-In' parenting style and surrender the doll battle just to stop the screaming. This parenting
- 10 method is often based on the feeling of guilt parents have over their long working hours. Parents are also aware that their children are under pressure from their peers to have the latest toys and gadgets. As a result, they give in easily. There are also some parents who just want to see their children smile, so they reach readily into their wallets.



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Lifelong negative effects

- 15 **3** Since this particular mother's battle just involves a little doll, which is not going to break the bank, does it really matter? Well, actually, it does—in the long run! Studies show that children who are used to getting their way become overly dependent on their parents.
- 20 Therefore, later in life they mistakenly believe that they need to rely on other people to make them happy. Spoilt children tend to lack critical problem-solving skills as everything is done for them. Because they have never learnt that relationships involve giving and
- 25 taking, spoilt children often grow up into immature adults.

Change is better late than never

- 4** The doll mother was standing quite still while her daughter was waiting for her next move. I was
- 30 watching the drama unfold when something occurred to me. What if it was already too late for the doll mother? What if her child was already ruined as a result of a lifetime of getting her way? Childhood development experts offer hope by saying that it is never too late to do a complete U-turn, no matter how
- 35 daunting it may seem. They say that the trick to 'unspoiling' a child is to take baby steps towards change and to remain consistent. I was reading an article on the topic recently when the following advice caught my eye:

- 40 • Encourage a lot of free play.
- Rules are rules. Do not negotiate.
 - Never give in to tantrums.
 - Offer encouragement instead of gifts.
